SUPPORT AND EMPOWER SURVIVORS AND VICTIMS OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE AND EDUCATE THE COMMUNITY ABOUT THE CAUSE, IMPACT, AND PREVENTION OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

IN THE PAST YEAR, OUR ORGANIZATION, THE DESIGNATED RAPE CRISIS CENTER FOR SALT LAKE AND TOOELE COUNTIES, EXPERIENCED TRANSFORMATIVE GROWTH BY EXPANDING INTO TOOELE COUNTY AND PROVIDING CRUCIAL SUPPORT TO SURVIVORS, INCLUDING THOSE WHO ARE INCARCERATED. WE'VE ALSO SEEN AN INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF UNHOUSED SURVIVORS SEEKING SUPPORT FROM US. OUR COMMITMENT TO COMPREHENSIVE CARE IS REFLECTED IN OUR SERVICE MODEL. WE CONDUCTED NUMEROUS INDIVIDUAL AND GROUP SESSIONS, HOSPITAL ACCOMPANIMENTS, REACHED A WIDE AUDIENCE THROUGH IMPACTFUL OUTREACH EFFORTS, AND ENGAGED PARTICIPANTS IN PREVENTION PROGRAMS. SPECIAL INITIATIVES, SUCH AS LET'S TALK: ENGAGING MEN AND BOYS AND THE PEER ADVOCACY COUNCIL, UNDERSCORE OUR COMMITMENT TO INCLUSIVITY AND AMPLIFYING DIVERSE VOICES. 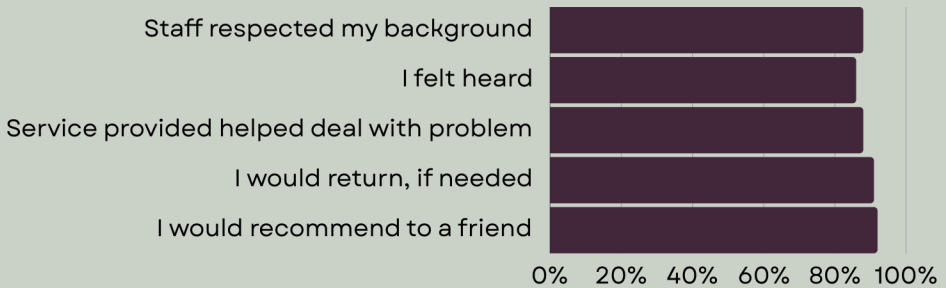

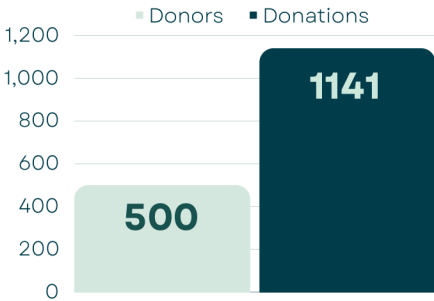
FINANCIAL SUMMARY
